November 20th Speaker: MARK C. TEBBITT, Ph.D.

Since I was a small child growing up in England I have been an avid gardener with an interest in all kinds of plants. These days I am especially interested in alpine, arid-land, and woodland plants. In 2007 I moved to Uniontown to take a position as a botany professor at California University of Pennsylvania. As part of this job, I teach, conduct taxonomic research on the genus Begonia, and curate the Biology Department's greenhouse. Prior to moving to Pennsylvania I was head of the Horticultural Taxonomy Program at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden in New York City. Before that I worked on the European Garden Flora project at the Royal Botanic Garden, Edinburgh. As a taxonomist I have conducted botanical fieldwork throughout the world, with much of my fieldwork involving the collection of begonias, hardy orchids and saxifrages. In the past ten years I have had the opportunity to visit Andean South America on several occasions and have developed a keen interest in the plants of this wonderful mountain range.

Topic: Plant hunting in the Andes: An overview of my plant collecting experience in the Ecuadorian, Peruvian, and Bolivian Andes. Each year I visit the Andes to collect and research begonias. I will talk about my work on these tropical plants as well as some of the other tropical, temperate and subalpine Andean plants that I have encountered. The emphasis will be on garden worthy plants, especially those already in cultivation.

AVIARY GARDEN

If there is a touchstone for our Chapter, it is the Aviary Rock Garden maintained by a dedicated group of our members. Here is a 12 month a year beautiful rock garden featuring plants of diverse forms and colors - from early season bulbs, primulas, iris, and sedum to fall blooming gentiana, from all the perennials that keep the garden a real showplace during the winter.

Looking at the garden there is always a heartfelt feeling of accomplishment. All year passers-by stop to make such nice compliments about the garden - no, we have not harvested any new members, but we are hopeful.

Some garden highlights included Sedum rupestre 'Angelina', Primula juliae 'Jay-Jay', Tulip 'Lady Jane', Delosperma 'Gold Nugget', a Daphne sp. that lit up the garden and then died for no apparent reason. A few other plants included Liatris microcephala, Gentiana paradoxa, Gentiana verna, Campanula Bavarian White and Bavarian Blue, and Talinum (annual species).

Minutes of September Meeting

The September 11, 2016 meeting of the Allegheny Chapter of the North American Rock Garden Society was called to order at the Northland Public Library at 2:10 p.m. by Chair Karen Schmidt. 32 members, 6 guests and 3 new members (Don Garwood, Ron and Dot Sims) were welcomed.

Karen introduced the guest speaker, Joseph Tychonievich. Joseph is a nationally renowned author, speaker and gardening expert. His first book, "Plant Breeding for the Home Gardener" was among the most celebrated and best-selling titles published by Timber Press in 2013. Organic Gardening named Joseph one of the "six young horticulturists who are helping to shape how America gardens".

"The World of Rock Gardening" was the subject of Joseph's program. During his talk he explained the basic principles of creating rock gardens. He shared beautiful, inspiring pictures of rock gardens he had visited while doing research for his new book, "Rock Gardening – Reimaging a Classic Style Garden Techniques - Plants". Joseph ended his presentation by stating that rock gardens are starting to go main stream for the following reasons:

- the hardy succulent craze
- fairy gardening (rock gardens with props)
- many people have small spaces, therefore, containers are being used
- rock garden plants are easier to manage
- a shift in design
- it fits into today's lifestyle
- the emergence of meadow grass gardening

A final thought – embrace and appreciate what grows in the climate you have.

There was a refreshment break and the raffle. This also gave everyone the opportunity to purchase unique plants our speaker had brought from Arrowhead Alpines.

The Business Meeting began with the reading of the August 21, 2016 minutes by Dianne Passoth. Linda Kalcevic moved and Bobbi Diller seconded that the minutes be approved as read. The motion passed unanimously.

This activity will start promptly at 9 a.m., because we have only 3 hours to complete our work. Another group has reserved the meeting room after us, and we need to have all materials packed and the room clean by 12 noon.

Participants will process quantities of seed donated by NARGS members from around the world. Seeds for each variety will be divided into smaller quantities, placed in glassine envelopes and labeled for the annual sale known as the NARGS Seed Exchange. Through this annual sale, many choice or hard to find seeds are made available to NARGS members at very reasonable prices thanks to the support from members of the Allegheny Chapter and other chapters in preparing the seed packets.
